

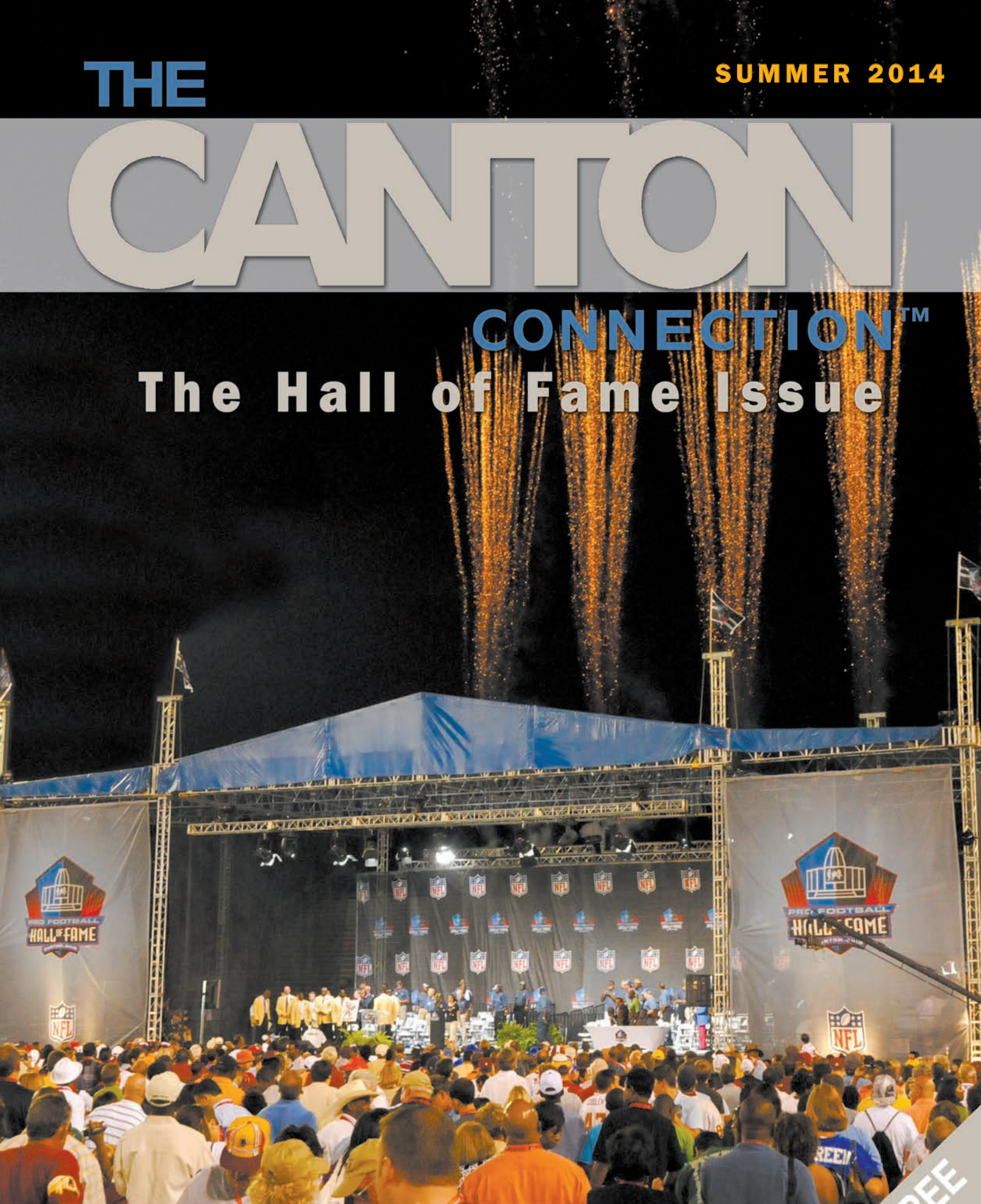

Market Heights Neighborhood Association

For one weekend every spring and fall, the streets of Market Heights fill with bargain hunters seeking elusive treasure while signs, balloons, banners, and displays of goods entice shoppers.

Scores of garages, yards, and driveways in this charming Northwest Canton neighborhood overflow with all imaginable treasures for sale – this neighborhood bazaar provides a perfect storm for garage sale shoppers. The events also give hundreds of visitors the opportunity to visit Market Heights. Look for the next sale Aug. 8 and 9 from 9AM to 4PM each day. The annual sales are two in an array of activities organized by the Market Heights Neighborhood Association for this iconic neighborhood for some 470 homes nestled around the small Brian C. Roshong Police Memorial Park.

Stretching north from 30th St. NW to 37th St. NW and west from Market Ave. North to Frazer Ave. NW, Market Heights grew out of the farmlands and orchards of Canton's North Market Heights addition established in 1924.

Market Heights offers a picture of

Americana in Canton with well-kept lawns and homes on tree lined streets as diverse as the neighborhood's families, nothing cookie cutter about the area—children playing, the hum of lawnmowers, residents walking their dogs, joggers, and all that comes in a community.

The neighborhood association strives to create a sense of safety and security and protect the integrity of the neighborhood through community awareness and promoting a positive quality of life.

Along with garage sales in recent years, activities included adding a gazebo and landscaping to the park, an annual Easter egg hunt, neighborhood socials, clean-up days, Halloween festivities, block watch coordinators, security patrols, representation with the city, and a newsletter and website.

The neighborhood association originally formed in 1961 but disbanded after a few years. The organization reformed in 1995 under its current by-laws and holds an annual meeting and election and open monthly meetings.

The volunteer association operates with support from the community and the Stark Community Foundations. ♦

Canton Parks – Your Tax Dollars at Work

With the support of our citizens resulting in the passage of the November 2013 Park Levy, Canton Parks is on the brink of an exciting year of redevelopment. Cantonians have already begun to notice new signage at many of our larger parks along with trash can upgrades and tree plantings. However, there is more in store for parks across the city as the warm weather allows our crews to continue their work.

Some of the most visible projects will include new asphalt surfaces at the Lee Park and Nimisilla Park basketball courts, new swing sets at Roshong Park and Lawrence Park, and limestone walking trails at Bup Rearick and Garaux Parks. These projects are just a few of the items that citizens can expect to see as signs of new life in Canton Parks.

The most exciting and high impact improvement for 2014 will be the replacement of the Herbert Fisher

Stadium Park Walking Track. The track has served our park patrons well for over 25 years, but due to the heavy foot traffic and weathering over this time, a full replacement will take place this summer. Thanks to the generosity of the Timken Foundation combined with taxpayer dollars from the Canton Joint Recreation District and Canton Park Levy, this track will be replaced to be enjoyed by the next generation of Cantonians.

While many of these improvements will be obvious to park patrons, others will be less visible but just as significant in terms of park security. Many of the park bathrooms throughout the city will receive security upgrades to their entryways with new metal doors that close automatically and lock between dusk and dawn.

The levy has also allowed the parks to partner with the Canton Police Department to provide a full time park police officer. This officer will be responsible for enforcing many of the

nuisance issues that the Park office receives. Items such as littering, dog owner's responsibilities for dog waste, prohibiting the feeding of animals, and proper use of park facilities and trails will be a top patrol priority in addition to traditional criminal enforcement. The officer will also be able to engage with the public through the use of regular bike patrols.

These physical improvements to the parks are only important if we are able to maximize their usage by our citizens. Several new activities and programs are being developed in tandem with the Canton Joint Recreation District, Stark Parks, and Plain Parks and Recreation to help make everyone aware of these new features, facilities, and trail systems. 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The Road Ahead

In spite of the extensive damage that this winter's extreme conditions have made to our roads, we are proud of our efforts and have several projects in the works.

This spring, Canton received two awards for the complete street project that was constructed on Walnut Ave. last year. This first of its kind project in Ohio earned an Honor Award from Ohio's American Society of Civil Engineers, and the award for 2014 Outstanding Highway Project under \$3 million dollars from the American Society of Highway Engineers, Cuyahoga Valley Section.

In addition to infrastructure work, our newly created Urban Forestry Division has been busy as well. In an effort to preserve and protect our natural environment, our City Arborist, Dick Drake, in cooperation with our Parks Department was able to save and relocate a honey bee hive that was discovered in a dead tree that was felled to prevent it from falling on its own and potentially injuring our parks patrons. The hive was relocated by a local beekeeper and is thriving in its new

home and will help pollinate our summer flowers and garden vegetables. While this success might be considered a small accomplishment by many, it is yet another example of how our department is working to engineer solutions in harmony with our environment and to preserve our natural resources.

This year's biggest news, however, is the sheer magnitude of construction work that we have under way. All totaled, we anticipate having over \$40 million worth of construction projects underway through the Engineering Department. These projects have been years in the making and will improve gateway corridors like 12th St. and Mahoning Rd., solve notorious drainage problems like those on 41st St. NW and 37th St. NW, improve roadways that have been in desperate need of work like 55th St. NE, secure critical sanitary sewer infrastructure like that along Allenford Ave. SE, upgrade the last of our outdated traffic signal systems on Navarre Rd., and resurface streets throughout the city.

We are working hard to help transform Canton back into a livable community where people want to live, work and play. ♦

Spring and Summer Rain Events

Rain events in northeast Ohio are welcomed by most all of us. However, some rain events can become hazardous especially to public and private property. When rainwater becomes uncontrolled runoff, the trailing affect can sometimes cause mud, gravel, and washouts to occur in the streets and roadways of our community. To ensure that the public roadways are kept safe during such events, engineering practices have been put into place to control the amount of rainwater runoff leaving a particular site. In general terms, the more surface covered by grass and woodlands the less rainwater runoff.

Conversely, the opposite is true in most cases. The more the surface is covered with asphalt, concrete, or building tops, the higher the degree of rainwater run-off. Therefore, a balance between the two help ensures a robust development process while ensuring public safety.

There are times, however; that rainwater runoff can become a nuisance in spite of the proper drainage practices as recommended by our Engineering Department. Over the last ten years, the Collection Systems Department has worked closely with our Engineering Department to minimize the effects of uncontrollable rainwater runoff. By installing new

storm sewers and catch basins, many roadway areas have seen drainage and runoff problems minimized.

In 2013, the Collections Department installed a new storm sewer at a location that experienced problems with roadway washout. With the design assistance from our Engineering Department, our crew was able to complete the project in a short amount of time with the expectations of positive results. ♦

Gas and Electric Aggregation, or Aggravation?

Did you know that you, your neighbors, and Canton's small businesses have collectively saved millions of dollars on your natural gas bills in the last decade? How? By voting to let the city of Canton be the first local government in our area to buy bulk natural gas for you by combining the power of group purchasing and a skilled, certified broker.

The sale of utilities used to be tightly regulated by government until 2001. After Ohio deregulated natural gas and electricity sales, concerned citizens came to Canton City Council to decry painfully higher winter gas bills. You asked Council to "do something about it." We did.

Canton began with an "opt-in" gas program which many of you joined voluntarily. Then City Council passed an ordinance authorizing a ballot election on automatically inclusive "opt-out" aggregation for city residents. You voted in favor of it by a 70% majority in November, 2001. Since then I've worked with several mayoral administrations, councils, and broker Mark Burns to help find better deals for you as a group than you could usually get on your own. The natural gas discounts have quietly saved Canton's citizens \$4.3 million dollars in the past six years, and the more recently added electric program saved \$2.9 million in just two years. These are dollars that you could use to focus on other important needs of your families and businesses.

You may have noticed that similar aggregation programs exist in the townships and the county. Most Ohioans who

have chosen a private alternate energy supplier have done so through their local governments. You likely receive letters from competing gas and electric energy providers offering you prices as an individual. These letters arrive because aggregation has spurred competition. As always though, please be sure to read the fine print about fees and commitments. We carefully and selectively join with new energy partners periodically. When we do, you will receive notification letters with the logo of the city of Canton on the letterhead.

We've tried to eliminate the "aggravation" in aggregation by negotiating on your behalf, even giving you the choice to leave or "opt-out" of our city programs without a penalty if you prefer another supplier. Otherwise, you automatically enjoy the benefits of our "opt out" programs if you qualify for them.

Pothole Patrol

POTHOLES

A pothole is defined as a type of weakness in asphalt pavement, caused by the presence of water in the underlying soil structure. When freezing and thawing occurs, damage to pavement only accelerates due to cracks that are caused by the frost action. The frost action has opened up the asphalt but it also does not allow for the pavement to drain due to the frozen layers of supporting soil underneath the pavement. Add the spring rains, and unfortunately the City of Canton is in a “perfect storm” for pothole formation.

REPAIRING POTHOLES

When it comes to patching potholes, there are different types of asphalts available to help complete the task. “Hot Mix” asphalt has temperatures exceeding 300 degrees Fahrenheit. This asphalt is sold primarily through the construction season of May through October and is ideal for repair work. Thanks to the high temperature of the asphalt, the dry street condi-

tions, and the temperature of the existing pavement, most of these repairs work well.

“Cold Mix” asphalt is available year round. It may be heated, but not to the temperatures of Hot Mix asphalt. Most of the time it does not have any temperature difference from the surrounding air temperature, therefore a cold material is being applied to a cold pavement surface. Add this to the moisture that probably exists in the hole due to the time of year and you have an inferior and often temporary fix.

Since January of this year, Canton has been attempting to address the potholes throughout the city by using “Cold Mix” asphalt. This isn’t ideal; however it is the only option currently available to us in the winter months. This is a “band-aid” solution cities must use until the Hot Mix asphalt is produced. The City Street Department has used over 800 tons of Cold Mix asphalt since January to fill the emerging potholes. This is all hand shoveled, equaling over a million

pounds of asphalt moved by our employees.

ALTERNATIVES

Some of our streets are in such disarray due to the potholes that the city has attempted some unconventional solutions. For example, 12th Street NE is scheduled to have a complete rebuild of the existing road surface starting in 2014. Milling (or removing) the existing asphalt surface down to the brick was done to help alleviate the pothole problem in that area and prepare it for its resurfacing later this year. This also allowed us to expend our resources on other areas of the City needing road repairs. Patience is needed during this pothole season. Most of the streets in the Canton need some degree of repair. As the “Hot Mix” asphalt starts to become available, the potholes will begin to disappear. In the meantime, be aware of the pavement conditions wherever you go, and please slow down. ♦



Water Reclamation Facility Breaks Ground for \$80M Project

A groundbreaking ceremony was held at the City of Canton Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) in May to kick off construction of improvements mandated by the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency to reduce phosphorus discharge levels to Nimishillen Creek. In addition to the one of the largest project labor agreements between the City of Canton and the East Central Building Trades, the contract for the project construction was awarded to Shook Construction. Shook Construction will be utilizing several

local subcontractors as part of the project construction. When combined with the contract for the membrane process equipment (\$28,795,081) and engineering fees (\$4,972,200), the project costs total \$80,006,746. This is significantly below the anticipated costs projected during the design phase of the project. Once completed, the WRF project will be the largest capital improvement project ever undertaken by any governmental entity in Stark County and will be the largest facility of its type in the world. Construction com-

pletion is scheduled for late 2017.

WRF is a City of Canton owned, regional facility that treats wastewater from the City of Canton, City of North Canton, and the Stark County Metropolitan Sewer District. Each of the three entities share in daily operation costs, as well as all capital projects. The cost sharing for this project are 50.15% for the City of Canton, 1.85% for the City of North Canton and 47% for the Stark County Metropolitan Sewer District. ♦

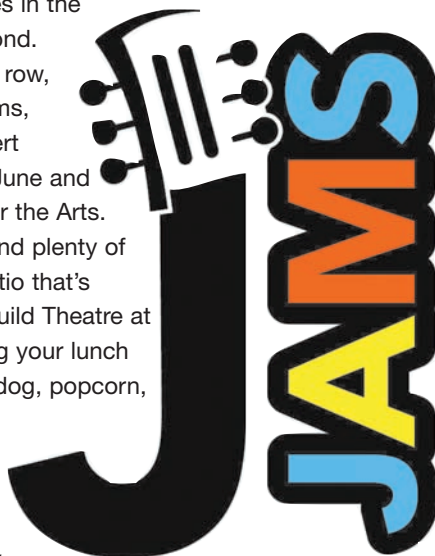
One of the best things about summer in the city are the smells, sights, and most assuredly, the sounds that arch through the avenues in the

In early childhood division classes led by Julie Mizer Grasse—Mom & Me for toddlers, Predance for three year olds, Creative Movement I & 2 for fours and fives, and Preballet for six year olds—children learn to release their imagination through rhythm and music and to enjoy the magic as well as the discipline of movement.

Two special events are Dance Camps June 16-20 and August 4-8 for ages three to six years. Ages 3-4

51 Years of Honoring the Legends of Professional Football

It all began on December 9, 1959, when an article appeared in *The Canton Repository* heralding a home for pro football.

The article made the argument for our community—the birthplace of professional football—but to make the Hall of Fame a reality in Canton, the article called for “a combined Herculean effort on the part of civic and sports leaders, industry, and perhaps more important, just plain fans.”

Our community answered that challenge, and just three months later, Canton, Ohio, was named the official site of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The Hall of Fame opened its doors to the public on September 7, 1963, along with the induction of the inaugural class of 17, and four Enshrinement Festival events were held that same year as a way to feed and entertain the Enshrinees and their families while they were in town.

Over the years, the Hall of Fame has enjoyed five expansions, most recently The “Future 50” Expansion and Renovation Project which was completed in the summer of 2013. It was the largest in Hall history at a cost of \$27 million and paved the way for success in the next 50 years.

Likewise, the Enshrinement Festival has grown from just four events that first year to 24 events today, experienced over two and half weeks by nearly 700,000 people, and resulting in an economic impact of nearly \$32 million for Canton/Stark County, and \$56 million for the State of Ohio.

The Herculean effort called for back in 1959 still exists today on an annual basis, with 4,200 extraordinary community volunteers and the professional staffs of the Canton Regional Chamber of Commerce and Pro Football Hall of Fame planning and staging the events that surround the central focus of the entire celebration:

the Enshrinement of football players, coaches, and contributors into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

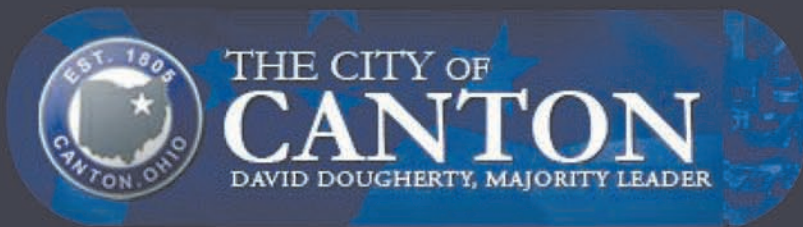
